A Provocative People

Leviticus 20:26, "You are to be holy to me because I, the LORD, am holy, and I have set you apart from the nations to be my own."

Provocative. Is that a word that you would use to describe yourself? Most of us would immediately say no because of the connotations associated with that word. I would dare say, however, that we, as believers, should be and are called to be, a provocative people.

The definition of provocative is "serving to stimulate discussion or excite controversy." We should live such provocative lives that our children ask questions and the world takes notice. When you look at our spiritual ancestors...Noah, Abraham, John the Baptist...they stood out as different. They stimulated discussion and definitely excited controversy. Unfortunately, many Christians look just like the rest of the world; there is no discernible difference between the children of light and the children of darkness.

How can we influence the people around us and convince them that they need what we have if our faith doesn't look any different that what they already have? What kind of people ought we to be? Peter said, "You ought to live holy and godly lives," 2 Peter 3:11. That's easy enough to say, but what does it look like?

Because we are human, believers face the same temptations, struggles, and difficulties that everyone else does. How we handle those situations is what should stand out. Noah, Abraham, and John knew what God wanted them to do, and even though they faced ridicule and misunderstanding, they did what they were called to do. We, too, know what we should do, but we allow the world to dictate our actions. Maybe it's time we sacrificed political correctness and the acceptance of others for spiritual provocation. Too often we are more concerned with the approval of people than God.

James said, "Anyone, then, who knows the good he ought to do and doesn't do it, sins," James 4:17. So as you respond to every temptation, struggle, and difficulty, ask yourself if your actions will be more pleasing to people or to God. I guarantee if you stand up for godliness in every situation you will stimulate discussion with your children and excite controversy with the world.
