#### **How to Change the World**

In the 19<sup>th</sup> century, Israel Salanter shared a bit of wisdom that had taken years for him to acquire. He said, "When I was young, I wanted to change the world. I found it difficult to change the world, so I tried to change my nation. When I couldn't change the nation, I focused on my town. I couldn't change the town, so I tried to change my family.

Now, as an old man, I realize that the only thing I can change is myself. And suddenly I realize that if, long ago, I had changed myself, I could have made an impact on my family. My family could have made an impact on our town. The town's impact could have changed the nation, and I could indeed have changed the world."

It's common to want to change other people. After all, their faults and flaws are pretty obvious. But maybe instead of criticizing and browbeating, we should model. A teacher always responded to the question, "Can I go to the bathroom?" with "You may go to the bathroom." She gently modeled the correct words to use, and before long, she had a room full of seven-year-olds with good grammar.

Paul said, "Follow my example, as I follow the example of Christ," 1 Cor 11:1. That is a call for us to model Christ-like behavior for others to imitate. If you really want to change the world, you must start with yourself. In Hebrew, halakh means "to go" or "to walk." It represents the path to follow. It conveys the idea that we should be walking out the truth of God's word in such a way that it creates a path for others to follow.

This week, focus on making your path straight and on being a light that illumines the path for others. Change yourself, and you can change the world..
